Scholars Portal

- Technical infrastructure arm of the Ontario Council of University Libraries
- Large repositories of licensed ebook and ejournal content
- We're a content provider (aggregator?) **and** a library organization



Usage stats vs. user experience

We look to usage to tell us how useful an e-resource is to our community; but if usage changes over time, how much of that is a change in the usefulness of the content and how much is the usability of the site?

COUNTER: What are we counting?



The COUNTER code of practice ensures consistency for things like:

What "counts" as a user successfully accessing the full text

What "counts" as a unique user/unique access

Distinguishing between controlled content and open content



How do things like user experience & technical design interact with usage?
How do we know if people aren't using some content because they aren't even getting to the point where they see the "download" button?

The Convenience Factor


"If it's too inconvenient I'm not going after it"
(Connaway, Dickey & Radford, 2011)

1. Users won't always go out of their way to access an e-resource – especially if an easier-to-access resource is "good enough".
2. Discoverability plays an important role. Changing from journal-level to article-level linking in your discovery layer can increase journal usage by over 90% (Swab, 2019).
3. What impact does it have on usage when e-resources become more or less convenient to access?

The platform is a Trustworthy Digital Repository/light archive dedicated to digital preservation



Various other benefits over publisher platforms like bilingualism, data security, focus on accessibility, etc.

LibKey doesn't use the
same service order as
Primo. Here's what one
school's SP stats did after
implementing LibKey
(some SP collections
prioritized in Primo).



Caveats:

- Not all SP collections were available in Alma's KB at the start of 2020
- We don't know who activated our collections or when
- Some schools that didn't migrate in December 2019 still experienced a link resolver change in early 2020



Takeaways:

- Expect some usage fluctuation when you change your discovery/access tools (especially something like LibKey!)
- For the most accurate measure of usage, combine usage for the same title across platforms



Ease of access of DRM-protected ebooks

Canadian University Press Ebooks



Deal between Association of Canadian University Presses (ACUP), OCUL, and CRKN to provide access to ACUP titles on SP Books



We load (almost) all ACUP titles, including publishers/titles not available electronically on other platforms



Titles that were expected to be course adoption books could be assigned restrictive DRM by the publisher




DRM status could become less restrictive over time



ACUP DRM Timeline

SP uses Adobe Content Server to offer DRM'ed content

New SP Books platform launches with built-in handling of DRM

ACUP introduces a "3-user" upgrade for DRM-restricted books

New ACUP deal distributed by De Gruyter specifies no restrictions on simultaneous users



Legacy Books Platform

Single-user DRM is handled through Adobe Content Server.

In order to read a single-user title, users must download external software & link their Adobe accounts.

Default loan period: 3 days.

New Books Platform

Single-user DRM is handled natively in the platform. The experience is identical to opening a DRM-free title.

Title is “returned” after 10 minutes of inactivity.

Unique uses per title: old vs. new Books platform

	2016 (old platform)	2017 (old platform)	2019 (new platform)	2020 (new platform)
DRM-Free Titles	3.27	4.01	3.24	4.53
Single User Titles	2.29	2.28	10.36	7.02



Titles with NO use in a year: old vs. new Books platform

	2016 (old platform)	2017 (old platform)	2019 (new platform)	2020 (new platform)
DRM-Free Titles	54%	50%	57%	54%
Single User Titles	56%	56%	32%	43%



Titles with less than 5 uses in a year: old vs. new Books platform

	2016 (old platform)	2017 (old platform)	2019 (new platform)	2020 (new platform)
DRM-Free Titles	83%	81%	85%	83%
Single User Titles	84%	84%	65%	75%



Caveats:

- 2020 ^_^(ツ)_/^-
- What's the impact of ease of access vs. loan period?
- Changing DRM status/trends: 46% of ACUP titles were single-user in 2016, compares to only 38% in 2020
- Data comes from a sample—not the total



Takeaways:

- If an ebook is inconvenient to use, it probably won't be used very much
- Roadblocks that stop people from accessing the content won't necessarily show up in COUNTER stats
- If you see something funky in your stats... try exploring the user interface!



Usage stats vs. user experience

User experience does impact use.
E-resources that are easier to use will
see a higher volume of use.
More investigation is needed – but
take a critical eye to your stats!
